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INTRODUCTION

Houston's top 20 trade partners represented 71.4 percent of Houston's customs district traffic in '19. This report examines those vital trade partnerships through a variety of lenses. First, a substantive list of rankings, statistics and graphic illustrations examine Houston's global position as an international trade leader. Next, detailed profiles present each of Houston's top 20 trade partners, highlighting commercial and cultural connections to Houston and identifying emerging export opportunities. Concluding the report, a comprehensive set of data tables provides an in-depth look at Houston's global reach by listing the trade values for each of Houston's 97 traded commodity groups and the region's more than 200 international trade partners. In conducting their analysis and compiling this report, the Greater Houston Partnership research team incorporated information provided by the U.S. Department of Commerce, WISERTrade, the U.S. Census Bureau, and other sources listed throughout.





MEXICO

HOUSTON'S #1 TRADE PARTNER IN 2019

The Houston-Galveston Customs District is the fifth busiest gateway for U.S.-Mexico trade (by value) and Mexico is Houston's largest international trade partner. From '10 to '19, trade between Houston and Mexico averaged \$24.0 billion annually and was valued at \$21.7 billion in '19. Nearly 598,900 people living in the Houston metro were born in Mexico.

HOUSTON'S BUSINESS TIES


- Forty-one Houston firms operate 118 subsidiary locations in Mexico, including BMC Software, Halliburton, Kinder Morgan and Oceaneering International.
- Ten Mexico firms operate 23 subsidiaries in the Houston area, including Avant Energy, Cemex USA, Gruma, Net Brains and Prolamsa.
- Trade and cultural relationships with Mexico are facilitated in Houston through the Consulate General of Mexico, the U.S.-Mexico Chamber of Commerce, the Mexico Tourism Board, the trust fund of the Federal government of Mexico-ProMexico, the Institute of Hispanic Culture of Houston, as well as numerous festivals.
- The Houston Airport System offers a total of 67 daily flights from Houston to 22 cities in Mexico.
- Of Houston's 16 foreign-owned banks, one is from Mexico: BBVA Bancomer, S.A. Institución de Banca Múltiple, Grupo Fin.
- Tampico, Mexico was designated as one of Houston's 18 international sister cities in '03.

AIR CARGO TRADE

- Houston ranks as the 15th busiest gateway for U.S.-Mexico air cargo trade (by weight).
- Air cargo trade between Houston and Mexico totaled 590.7 metric tons in '19, a 23.0 percent increase over '18, and was valued at \$123.2 million.
- In '19, the top three commodities by weight were miscellaneous industrial components, equipment and parts; industrial equipment and computers; and electrical machinery, equipment and parts, accounting for 54.1 percent of total air cargo trade.

TRADE

Houston-Mexico trade is heavily reliant on mineral fuels and refined products. The first half of the last decade was import dominated mostly due to high import value of crude oil. That trend reversed in '15, however, when the imports of crude oil declined by nearly 60.0 percent and remained stagnant ever since. Exports, despite slight fluctuations, maintained a more stable trend mostly driven by refined oil and organic chemicals. Most recently, Houston-Mexico trade decreased from \$24.9 billion in '18 to \$21.7 billion in '19.

BRAZIL

HOUSTON'S #2 TRADE PARTNER IN 2019

The Houston-Galveston Customs District is the busiest gateway for U.S.-Brazil trade (by value) and Brazil is Houston's second largest international trade partner. From '10 to '19, trade between Houston and Brazil averaged \$13.3 billion annually and was valued at \$15.4 billion in '19. More than 8,800 people living in the Houston metro were born in Brazil.

HOUSTON'S BUSINESS TIES


- Forty-nine Houston firms operate 119 subsidiary locations in Brazil, including American Bureau of Shipping, BMC Software, Group 1 Automotive and Rignet.
- Eight Brazil firms operate 14 subsidiaries in the Houston area, including Braskem, Gerdau, Oxiteno, Petrobras and Stefanini IT Solutions.
- Trade and cultural relationships with Brazil are facilitated in Houston through the Consulate General of Brazil, Brazil-Texas Chamber of Commerce and the Brazilian Arts Foundation Houston, which provides cultural education and building community through the preservation and sharing of Brazilian culture.
- The Houston Airport System offers two daily nonstop passenger flights from Houston to Rio de Janeiro and Sao Paulo.

AIR CARGO TRADE

- Houston ranks as the sixth busiest gateway for U.S.-Brazil air cargo trade (by weight).
- Air cargo trade between Houston and Brazil totaled 5,383.0 metric tons in '19, a 10.8 percent increase over '18, and was valued at \$556.1 million.
- In '19, the top three commodities by weight were industrial equipment and computers; articles of iron or steel; and aircraft, spacecraft and parts, accounting for 54.2 percent of total air cargo trade.

TRADE

Over the past decade, Houston-Brazil trade averaged \$13.3 billion annually with most fluctuations driven by the change in trade value of mineral fuels, oils and refined products. At the start of the decade in the Houston-Brazil trade, Houston was a net importer of mineral fuels, oils and refined products. Over time, this trend flipped with Houston importing five times less mineral fuels from Brazil than ten years before. Most recently, Houston-Brazil trade recorded \$15.4 billion in '19, a 20.7 percent increase over '18. This rise was predominantly caused by increase in total value traded of industrial equipment and computers.

CHINA

HOUSTON'S #3 TRADE PARTNER IN 2019

The Houston-Galveston Customs District is the tenth busiest gateway for U.S.-China trade (by value) and China is Houston's third largest international trade partner. From '10 to '19, trade between Houston and China averaged \$15.0 billion annually and was valued at \$14.7 billion in '19. Nearly 75,400 people living in the Houston metro were born in China.

HOUSTON'S BUSINESS TIES

- Forty-four Houston firms operate 113 subsidiary locations in China, including Cook Compression, Exterran, Dresser-Rand, Halliburton and Schlumberger.
- Seventeen China firms operate 23 subsidiaries in the Houston area, including Air China, Fosun International, Little Sheep, PetroChina and Saic Motor.
- Trade and cultural relationships with China are facilitated in Houston through the Consulate General of China, the China General Chamber of Commerce, the Asian Chamber of Commerce, the American Chinese Culture Exchange Association, the Chinese Community Center and the Institute of Chinese Culture.
- The Houston Airport System offers five weekly nonstop passenger flights from Houston to Beijing.
- Of Houston's 16 foreign-owned banks, one is from China: Industrial and Commercial Bank of China.
- Shenzhen, China was designated as one of Houston's 18 international sister cities in 1986.

AIR CARGO TRADE

- Houston ranks as the 13th busiest gateway for U.S.-China air cargo trade (by weight).
- Air cargo trade between Houston and China totaled 18,083.9 metric tons in '19, a 10.0 percent decline over '18, and was valued at \$892.4 million.
- In '19, the top three commodities by weight were industrial equipment and computers; electrical machinery, equipment and parts; and articles of iron or steel, accounting for 57.5 percent of total air cargo trade.

TRADE

Over the past decade, Houston-China trade nearly doubled, steadily climbing from \$9.1 billion in '10 to \$19.9 billion in '18. This trend was interrupted only in '16 due to the fall in the imports of industrial equipment and computers. Most recently, Houston-China trade observed another decline, recording \$14.7 billion in '19, a 25.9 percent decrease compared to '18. This time around, values of almost all the goods both imported and exported dropped considerably, mostly as a result of the U.S.-China trade war.

SOUTH KOREA

HOUSTON'S #4 TRADE PARTNER IN 2019

The Houston-Galveston Customs District is the second busiest gateway for U.S.-South Korea trade (by value) and South Korea is Houston's fourth largest international trade partner. From '10 to '19, trade between Houston and South Korea averaged \$7.4 billion annually and was valued at \$13.5 billion in '19.

HOUSTON'S BUSINESS TIES


- Nine Houston firms operate 29 subsidiary locations in South Korea, including BMC Software, Huntsman International, National Oilwell Varco, NetlQ and Universal Weather & Aviation.
- Thirty South Korea firms operate 32 subsidiaries in the Houston area, including DSME, Hyundai Steel USA, Korea National Oil, POSCO America and Samsung Heavy Industries.
- Trade and cultural relationships with South Korea are facilitated in Houston through the Consulate General of Korea, the Korean-American Chamber of Commerce of Houston, the Korean Community Center of Houston, the Korean-American Society of Houston and the Houston Korean Education Center.

AIR CARGO TRADE

- Houston ranks as the 14th busiest gateway for U.S.-South Korea air cargo trade (by weight).
- Air cargo trade between Houston and South Korea totaled 1,842.5 metric tons in '19, a 11.0 percent increase over '18, and was valued at \$67.4 million.
- In '19, the top three commodities by weight were industrial equipment and computers; articles of iron or steel; and plastics and plastic products, accounting for 58.6 percent of total air cargo trade.

TRADE

Houston-South Korea trade averaged \$6.1 billion during the first seven years of the past decade, but trended upward during the last three years to reach a 10-year peak of \$13.5 billion in '19. This growth is attributed to an increase in exports, while imports remained stable. Organic chemicals and electrical machinery were initially the major commodities that made up the export basket, but these commodities have been overshadowed by mineral fuels, oil and refined products since '17. Houston-South Korea trade increased 29.5 percent from \$10.4 billion in '18 to \$13.5 billion in '19.



TRADE

Houston-Netherlands trade recorded a decade-low of \$6.1 billion in '10, only to increase significantly the following year. Since '11, trade fluctuated before rising to a 10-year high of \$11.7 billion in '19. For the past three years, Houston-Netherlands trade trended upward, growing an average of 17.5 percent annually. On average, the value of export goods was five-fold the value of import goods over the last decade. Mineral oil, fuel and refined products were the most traded commodity.



TRADE

Houston-India trade fluctuated over the past decade before peaking in '19 at \$10.1 billion. For the first seven years, import values of gums, resins and vegetable extracts were the main driving force of the trade dynamics that peaked in '12 reaching \$7.5 billion. Following years of steady decline, Houston-India trade rose again due to an increase in the total traded value of mineral fuels, oil and refined products. Import values of industrial equipment and computers and export values of organic chemicals have also contributed to the rise in the recent years.







COLOMBIA

HOUSTON'S #10 TRADE PARTNER IN 2019

The Houston-Galveston Customs District is the busiest gateway for U.S.-Colombia trade (by value) and Colombia is Houston's tenth largest international trade partner. From '10 to '19, trade between Houston and Colombia averaged \$8.3 billion annually and was valued at \$7.0 billion in '19. More than 31,100 people living in the Houston metro were born in Colombia.



AIR CARGO TRADE

- Houston ranks as the ninth busiest gateway for U.S.-Colombia air cargo trade (by weight).
- Air cargo trade between Houston and Colombia totaled 398.9 metric tons in '19, a 38.9 percent decrease over '18, and was valued at \$23.8 million.
- In '19, the top three commodities by weight were industrial equipment and computers; miscellaneous industrial components, equipment and parts; and articles of iron or steel, accounting for 70.4 percent of total air cargo trade.

TRADE

Houston-Colombia trade reached a ten-year high of \$11.7 billion in '13, then gradually declined to \$5.0 billion in '16. The decline was due to a drop in the value of oil exports and the depreciation of the Colombian peso. For the past three years, however, Houston-Colombia trade has been on a growth trajectory mostly due to an increase in the total value traded of mineral fuels and refined products. In '19, total trade amounted to \$7.0 billion, a 9.6 percent increase compared to '18. This growth can be attributed to the increase in import value of crude oil.

AIR CARGO TRADE

- Houston ranks as the tenth busiest gateway for U.S.-Italy air cargo trade (by weight).
- Air cargo trade between Houston and Italy totaled 5,834.6 metric tons in '19, a 0.1 percent decline over '18, and was valued at \$305.9 million.
- In '19, the top three commodities by weight were industrial equipment and computers; articles of iron or steel; and electrical machinery, equipment and parts, accounting for 65.0 percent of total air cargo trade.

TRADE

During the last decade, Houston-Italy trade fluctuated but nearly tripled from 10-year low of \$2.6 billion in '10 to a peak of \$6.8 billion in '18. This growth was mostly driven by an increase in the traded value of mineral fuels, oils and refined products. Most recently, total trade was \$6.6 billion in '19, down 3.2 percent from the previous year.





TRADE

Houston-Taiwan trade remained below \$2.2 billion from '10 to '17, then rapidly grew 169.0 percent in '18 to \$5.3 billion, largely due to a surge in the export value of crude oil. Trade between the two countries remained above \$5 billion in '19, despite a slight decline of 1.1 percent to \$5.2 billion. In the past two years, trade has been dominated by exports, averaging 80.2 percent. During the prior eight years, trade had been more evenly divided between exports and imports, averaging 44.2 percent and 55.8 percent, respectively.





- The Houston Airport System offers daily nonstop passenger flights from Houston to Paris, France.
- Of Houston's 16 foreign-owned banks, three are from France: Credit Agricole Corporate and Investment Bank, Natixis and Société Générale.
- Nice, France was designated as one of Houston's 18 international sister cities in 1973.

AIR CARGO TRADE

- Houston ranks as the 14th busiest gateway for U.S.-France air cargo trade (by weight).
- Air cargo trade between Houston and France totaled 4,562.0 metric tons in '19, a 3.5 percent increase over '18, and was valued at \$483.0 million.
- In '19, the top three commodities by weight were industrial equipment and computers; aircraft, spacecraft and parts; and plastics and plastic products, accounting for 51.0 percent of total air cargo trade.

TRADE

Over the last 10 years, Houston-France trade fluctuated between \$2.9 billion and \$5.3 billion. During the first three years of the past decade, trade rose rapidly to a peak of \$4.7 billion in '12 before going into a gradual decline. Trade reached a decade low of \$2.9 billion in '16, then slowly grew in '17 and '18. From '18 to '19, trade jumped 34.9 percent from \$3.5 billion to \$4.7 billion, largely due to an increase in the export value of mineral fuels, oil, and refined products, which accounted for 70.1 percent of exports in '19.
